# WELCOME BELOVED MEMBERS OF LEADERSHIP 100

Welcome beloved members of Leadership 100 to our 25<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference, which actually occurs 32 years since the founding of the Archbishop Iakovos Leadership 100 Endowment Fund by Archbishop Iakovos of Blessed Memory. I am told that it took six years before the Leadership 100 membership reached the critical mass to justify a full conference. How times have changed! Now we have difficulty in accommodating all who wish to attend. The membership grows each year thanks to the dedication of the Executive Committee, Board of Trustees, Officers, and Staff, while the grants in support of the National Ministries of the Archdiocese have grown dramatically.

The dedicated service of members who are mindful of their philanthropic commitment to our Church and Community is a testimony to faithfulness and purpose at a time when we are beset by lack of responsibility.

We face challenges today that are daunting, whether we look at the problems we face as a nation, or at the pressures on our Ecumenical Patriarchate, the economic crisis in Greece, the refugee crisis engulfing Europe, the Middle East and Africa, or the persistence of conflict and the persecution of Christians, also in the Middle East and Africa.

No one organization can, of course, adequately address this suffering, but as Christians we must make every effort to find in our hearts the compassion for those who are affected, and make every attempt to find the resources to respond in whatever way we can.

Leadership 100 has always demonstrated the vision to move boldly at such times of crisis, first and foremost, supporting the Church and its ministries to the faithful and those in need. This was most apparent in the aftermath of September 11, Hurricanes Katrina and Sandy, and the earthquakes and fires in Greece. Leadership 100 also has demonstrated a vision for the future, most recently evidenced by its support of the Saint Nicholas Greek Orthodox National Shrine. At the same time, it has enabled our youth to attend our Church Summer Camps, our seminarians at Hellenic College/Holy Cross School of Theology to enter the priesthood, and our Clergy to fulfill their ministries.

My own ministry, now honored as Geron with our Holy Archdiocese elevated to Gerontiki Eparchy of the Ecumenical Throne by His All Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew and the Holy and Sacred Synod of the Ecumenical Patriarchate, is further testimony to your faithfulness and that of the entire Church in America. By the grace of God and His unlimited mercies we have grown in faith and commitment to a maturity of responsible apostolic action that has transformed so many lives and institutions.

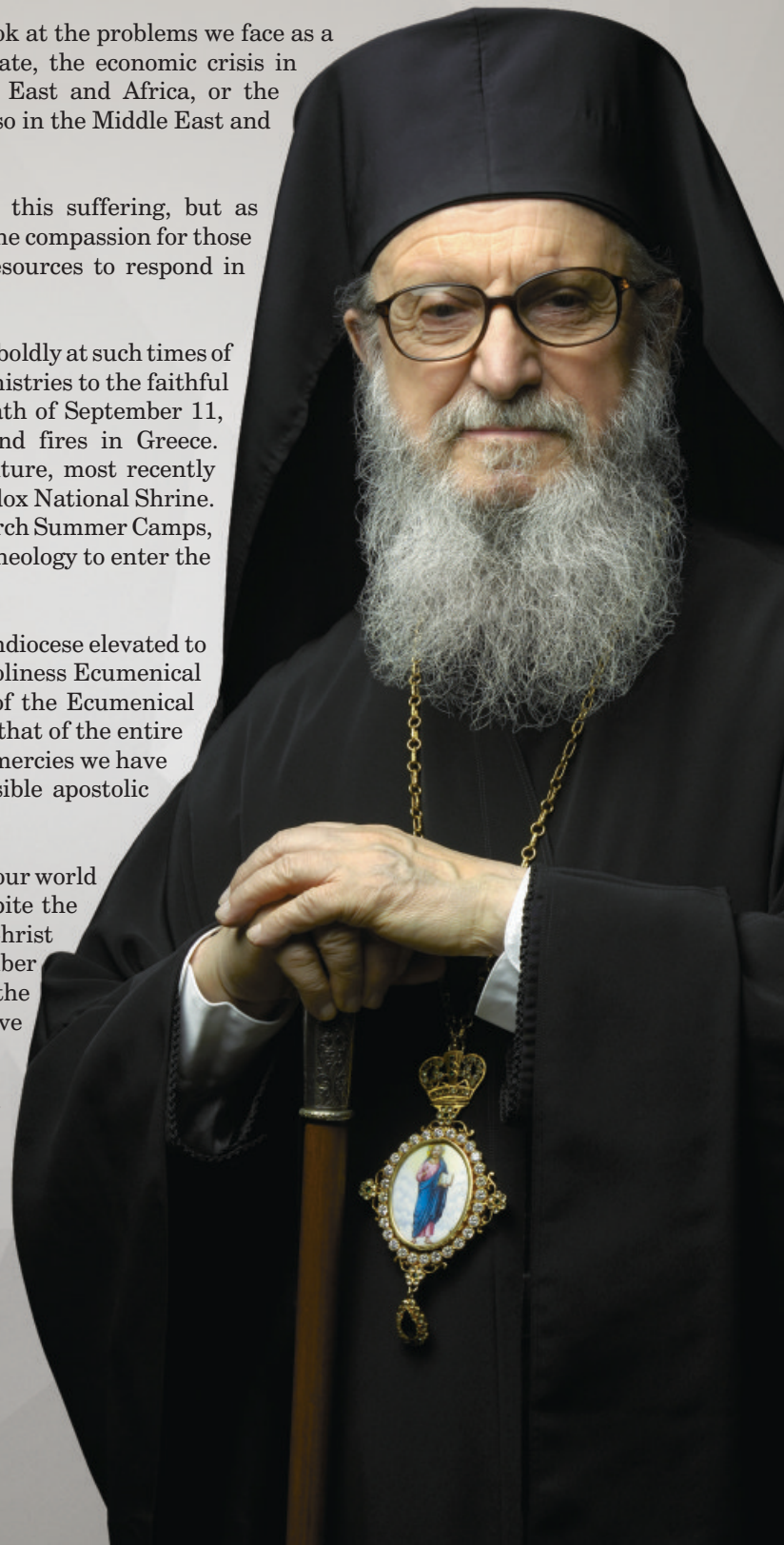

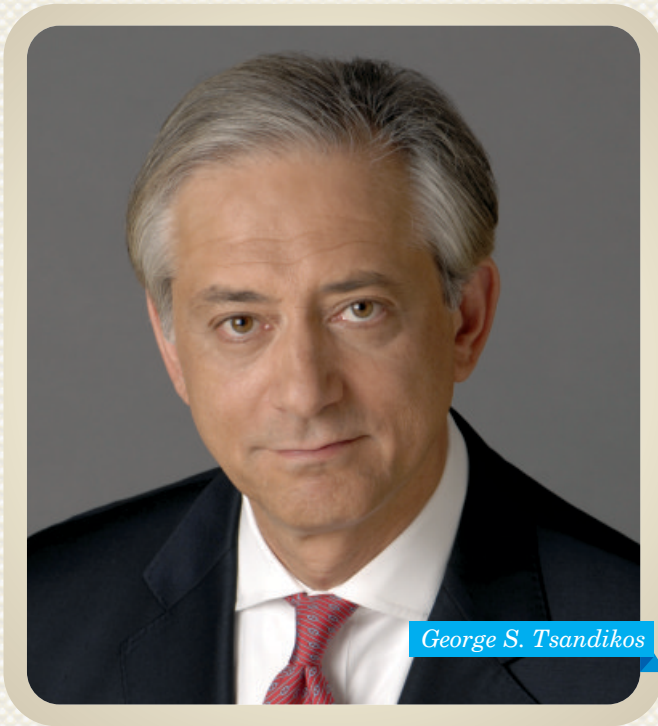

# WELCOME TO THE 25<sup>TH</sup> ANNUAL LEADERSHIP 100 CONFERENCE

The Business Forum will feature a prominent member of Leadership 100, James M. Orphanides, Partner and President of Centurion Holdings LLC. We will also once again enjoy the Friday evening Greek Glendi. The Saturday events will include a Special Forum in the morning conducted by Eleni Tsakopoulos-Kounalakis, former U.S. Ambassador to Hungary, who has published a book on her experiences in that post.

At the Grand Banquet on Saturday evening, the Archbishop Iakovos Leadership 100 Award for Excellence will be presented to the worthy recipients. Our conference will come to an end with the Sunday morning Hierarchical Divine Liturgy at the Holy Trinity Cathedral in Phoenix. I hope you will attend as many of these events as possible and, most especially, make every effort to attend the Sunday Liturgy so that we may worship together as one family and thank the Almighty God for our countless blessings.

I look forward to greeting you during the Conference and joining with you to review the achievements of the past year, commit to the goals for the future and celebrate our fellowship of faith and friendship.

### FORUM ON HELLENISM TO FEATURE BENAKI MUSEUM PRESENTATION AND EXHIBITS

Antonis Benakis, who founded the Museum in 1930 and donated it to the Greek state in 1931, was a Greek of the diaspora, a true internationalist. His legacy and his family's vision of a new and greater Greece is as alive today as it was during the Museum's founding. His commitment to Greece, its people and its heritage will continue to guide the

actions and set the priorities of the Museum for many years to come.

Through time, the Benaki Museum has become a depository of trust for both Greek collectors and philanthropists from many nations, who have enriched and expanded its collections and supported its programs. Today, the museum is composed of five different museums which display more than 500,000 artifacts, four research centers and unique archives that house 130,000 books, periodicals and rare documents, 500,000 photographic negatives, 50,000 original photographs and numerous documents and records that relate to history, architecture and the performing arts. The third most popular museum destination in Athens, after the Acropolis and the New Acropolis Museum, its international reputation places the Benaki among the most respected cultural institutions worldwide.

The main themes of the Museum's public activities embrace Archaeology, Byzantine and Post-Byzantine Culture, Neo-Hellenic Art and Material Culture, European Art, Islamic Art, World Cultures, Design,

Architecture, Photography, Music, Theatre, History and Literature. Main Collections include Greek Civilization, Islamic Art, Chinese Pottery and a Library holding the largest collection of books operating in a museum in Greece. Archives include the Photographic Archives, the Neo-Hellenic Architecture Archives, the Historical Archives and the Performing Arts Archives. Departments include Conservation and Information Technology.

The Museum welcomes over 150,000 visitors per year and offers a wide range of educational and cultural activities for all ages. With a breadth and variety of collections that sets it apart and a range of activities serving various social needs, the Benaki Museum is best described not as a historical museum, an art museum or a museum of decorative arts, but as a museum of Greek Civilization that brings Hellenic Culture into dialogue with world cultures.

In response to the economic crisis in Greece, the Benaki has renewed its commitment to vigorously promote Greece and Hellenism around the world and has refocused its energy to advance a new and positive narrative for the country and the continuing significance of Greek culture. To do so, the museum has opened a branch in Melbourne, Australia and has designed and is executing a long-term presence in the United States. The Museum wants all Hellenes, pan-Hellenes and people everywhere to reconnect with or learn of the perennial contributions of the Greeks to all human endeavor and to understand that there is far more to the country than what has often been reported in the media.

The Hellenism Forum on Thursday, February 18, 2016 will feature a presentation by Pavlos Yeroulanos, Greece's former Minister for Culture and Tourism, along with exhibits from the Benaki Museum of Athens. Yeroulanos is the great-grandson of the museum's founder, Antonis Benakis. The Benaki Museum exhibits, mounted at the Museum's expense prior to a United States tour, will comprise 40-50 exact replicas from the museum illustrating Greek art from the pre-historic to the contemporary period, a replica of the notable St. Nicholas Icon, and the original album of photographs from the first modern Olympic Games held in Athens in 1896. The Exhibits will open with an Agiasmos (blessing) by His Eminence Archbishop Demetrios of America.

The Benaki Museum is the only museum in the world that covers the history and art of Greek Civilization from pre-historic times until today. The mission of the Benaki is to safeguard and promote Greek culture, to study the links between periods of Hellenism and their interaction with neighboring cultures, and to provide visitors, students and scholars with a comprehensive narrative of the Greek impact on world history.

## SYMPHONY AT SUNSET TO BE PRESENTED

Symphony at Sunset will be presented on Thursday, February 18, 2016 through the generosity of Leadership 100 members Michael and Kay Johnson. The Phoenix Symphony will be conducted by Peter Tiboris, Founder, General Director and Artistic Director of MidAmerica Productions and Festival of the Aegean, featuring Steven Moeckel, violin and Eilana Lappalainen, soprano, and with a special performance by Theodosia Roussos, soprano and folk artist.

Greek American music director, conductor, and producer Peter Tiboris has enjoyed a worldwide career for more than forty years, of which the past thirty have been in New York City as founder and artistic director of MidAmerica Productions, with concerts in Carnegie Hall and Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall. He is founder of the Manhattan Philharmonic, Elysium Recordings, and the Festival of the Aegean in Syros, Greece. Since 1983, he has presented more than 1000 concerts worldwide, including 500 in historic Carnegie Hall, conducting many of them. He is also Music Director of the Pan-European Philharmonic, in Warsaw, Poland, and Principal Guest Conductor of Collegium Symphonium Veneto in Padua, Italy. He has conducted nearly every major choral work as well as countless symphonic works and select operas in 20 countries, among them Mexico, Canada, Russia, Great Britain, Germany, Austria, Poland, Czech

Republic, Italy, Portugal, Turkey, Egypt, and Israel.

Eilana Lappalainen is a Finnish-Canadian dramatic soprano and one of the most respected interpreters of Strauss' *Salome*, which she has performed at opera houses throughout the world. She has also been acclaimed for performances in other leading operas, such as *Lohengrin*, *Lulu*, *Der Rosenkavalier*, *Arabella*, *Jenufa*, *Madama Butterfly*, *Tosca*, *I Pagliacci*, *La Traviata*, *Turnandot*, *Don Giovanni* and *Aida*. Besides performances on international stages, she has taken on extensive responsibilities as General Director of the Greek Opera Studio and Berlin Opera Studio, Artistic Director for the Opera Division of the Young Artists Festival Bayreuth, Associate Artistic Director of the International Festival of the Aegean and Artistic Administrator for MidAmerica Productions.

The acclaimed violinist Steven Moeckel performs regularly as soloist, chamber musician and as concertmaster of The Phoenix Symphony. He has appeared as soloist and concert artist throughout Europe, South America, and the United States. Known for his artful interpretations, rich sound, and technical prowess, his extensive command of the concerto repertoire includes the works of Elgar, Tchaikovsky, Mozart, Beethoven, Sibelius, Berg, and Ysaye. He held the Concertmaster position with The Tucson Symphony Orchestra from 2002-2008.

Theodosia Roussos is an oboist, soprano and folk artist. As an oboist she has performed with the Boston Philharmonic and Mozart Classical Orchestra. As a folk artist, she has performed with Jackson Browne, Butch Morris and Niko Syropoulos. She regularly performs with her duo alongside guitarist Henry Garf, and as the lead singer of the Greek folk band Rozalia. She has a B.A. from UCLA and is currently attending Oberlin Conservatory of Music.

## **AMBASSADOR ELENI TSAKOPOULOS KOUNALAKIS TO ADDRESS SATURDAY FORUM**

Eleni Tsakopoulos Kounalakis, a longtime member of Leadership 100, will address the Saturday Forum on February 20, 2016, on the subject of her recently published memoir, *Madame Ambassador: Three Years of Diplomacy, Dinner Parties, and Democracy in Budapest*. She served as U.S. Ambassador to Hungary from January 7, 2010 to July 20, 2013.

The memoir, released on May 5, 2015, recounts her experiences being vetted for the position with no background in diplomacy, attending an ambassador “charm school” and an intensive

training session. However, in taking up her assignment in the former Soviet satellite, she feels that nothing could have prepared her for the realities of life in Hungary.

A property developer, Kounalakis is faced with organizing dinners and diplomatic meetings while her husband, Markos, a journalist, is discouraged from attending diplomats’ spouses’ gatherings. Her children, meanwhile, are faced with unexpected challenges at a new school.

Politically active, Kounalakis served as a delegate to the Democratic National Convention four times. She and her husband founded two university chairs in Hellenic Studies, at Georgetown and Stanford Universities, and a lecture series at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars. She has been awarded the Medal of St. Paul by the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America.

## **JAMES M. ORPHANIDES TO SPEAK AT BUSINESS FORUM**

James M. Orphanides, a prominent member of Leadership 100, who became a Partner and the President of Centurion Holdings LLC in January of 2010, will speak at the Business Forum on Friday, February 19, 2016. Orphanides had served as Chairman Emeritus of First American Title Insurance Company of New York and a Director until the company merged with its Parent, First American Title Insurance Company in November 2010. He worked for First American since 1992 in key executive positions and from 1996 through 2007 he was President, CEO and Chairman of the Board. Prior to joining First

American, Orphanides was a Principal and President of Preferred Land Title Services, Inc. from 1982-1992. He was an Executive at Commonwealth Land Title Insurance Company from 1979-1982 and an Executive at Chicago Title Insurance Company from 1972-1979. He is currently the Chairman and CEO of USRealty.com.

Orphanides has been actively involved in many not-for-profit organizations. He sits on the Boards of the Foundation for Medical Evaluation and Early Detection, Citizen Budget Commission, and CUNY TV

Foundation. He is also a member of the Hellenic American Bankers Association (HABA) and the Economic Club of New York; TPC Golf Club at Jasna Polana in Princeton, New Jersey; the Nassau Club in Princeton, New Jersey, The Williams Club, now a part of the Princeton Club of New York and The Metropolitan Club of New York.

Orphanides received a B.A. Degree from Heidelberg College and an M.A. Degree from Queens College of New York. Orphanides has three children and currently resides in Princeton, New Jersey with his wife Nora.
