ADMIRAL JAMES STAVRIDIS TO DELIVER KEYNOTE ADDRESS:

21ST CENTURY SECURITY: CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES

Admiral James Stavridis, USN (Ret), the 12th Dean of The Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy at Tufts University, will deliver the keynote address at the Grand Banquet on February 3, 2018.

A retired 4-star officer in the U.S. Navy, he led the NATO Alliance in global operations from 2009 to 2013 as Supreme Allied Commander with responsibility for Afghanistan, Libya, the Balkans, Syria, piracy, and cyber security. He also served as Commander of U.S. Southern Command, with responsibility for all military operations in Latin America from 2006-2009. He holds more than 50 medals, including 28 from foreign nations.

Earlier in his military career he commanded the top ship in the Atlantic Fleet, winning the Battenberg Cup, as well as a squadron of destroyers and a carrier strike group – all in combat. In 2016, he was vetted for Vice President by Hillary Clinton and subsequently invited to Trump Tower to discuss a cabinet position in the Trump Administration.

Admiral Stavridis earned a PhD in international relations and has published eight books and hundreds of articles in leading journals around the world. His 2012 TED talk on global security has over 700,000 hits. Admiral Stavridis is a monthly columnist for TIME Magazine and Chief International Security Analyst for NBC News, and has tens of thousands of connections on the social networks.


Sylvia M. Burwell, American University's 15th president and the first woman to serve as president, will address the Saturday Forum on February 3, 2108.

A leader with experience managing large and complex organizations in the public and private sectors, President Burwell brings to AU a commitment to education and research, a record of spurring innovation, and experience helping to advance solutions to some of the world's most pressing challenges. Burwell served as the 22nd secretary of the U.S. Department of Health

and Human Services from 2014 to 2017, was director of the Office of Management and Budget from 2013 to 2014, and spent 11 years at the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, including roles as chief operating officer and president of the Global Development Program.

She earned undergraduate degrees in government from Harvard University and in philosophy, policy, and economics from the University of Oxford, where she was a Rhodes Scholar. Sylvia and Stephen Burwell are the parents of two young children.

A 25 YEAR EVOLUTION OF THE INTERSECTION OF SPORT MEDIA AND SOCIETY

John Angelos, who has led business operations for the Baltimore Orioles for more than two decades, will address the Friday Forum on February 2, 2018. He is currently Executive Vice President of the club. He also serves as President and Chief Operating Officer of the Mid-Atlantic Sports Network (MASN), one of the leading U.S. regional sports media properties reaching millions of television households across seven states.


Most known for his executive management oversight and operation of Oriole Park at Camden Yards, The Ballpark that Forever Changed BaseballTM and stewardship of a ballpark and fan experience consistently acclaimed by both consumers and media, Angelos makes regular appearances on *CBS Television* and *Radio, Bloomberg Television* and *Radio, PBS, MSNBC, Fox Sports Radio, Rogers Television* and *Radio,* and has been featured in the *New York Times*, and the *Wall Street Journal*, and *The Nation*, among others.

Recently recognized as Marylander of the Year (Honorable Mention) by the *Baltimore Sun*, Angelos has been hailed by industry-bible *Sports Business Journal* as a "top-ten decision maker" on Major League Baseball

media and digital issues and for his "reinvention of the Spring Training business model" in creating taxpayer-conscious, public-private sports tourism development partnerships around sports venue, youth academy, and family entertainment real estate development that drive responsible fiscal return on investment for all stakeholders.

Angelos' professional and philanthropic focus has been on pioneering the use of sports and media platforms to create community benefit and change. Among his signature programs are the *Orioles Health & Fitness Challenge* for Sarasota-area students; the *Birdland Community Heroes and Americana Music* program which recognizes everyday heroes at weekend Orioles games; and *Nashville's Music Row Comes to the Ballpark*, a fundraiser bringing athletes and songwriters together to fund health and literacy programs, in addition to club efforts to help fight hunger locally, regionally, and internationally through a variety of partnerships.

Angelos joined the Orioles in 1994 and was named Executive Vice President of the club in 1999 and President of MASN in 2006. Angelos is a graduate of Duke University.



THE VERY REV. ARCHIMANDRITE NATHANAEL SYMEONIDES TO LEAD DISCUSSION ON:

TRANSFORMING THE WORLD THROUGH COLLABORATION: THE WORK OF THE DEPARTMENT OF INTER-ORTHODOX, ECUMENICAL AND INTERFAITH RELATIONS

The Very Rev. Archimandrite Nathanael Symeonides, Director of the Department, in order to emphasize the need for greater collaboration for more effective transformation, has asked four professionals to speak on the nature and importance of their work with the Archdiocese, at the Forum on Thursday, February 1, 2018.

They are:

Ms. Joyce Dubensky, Esq., CEO of Tanenbaum, will speak on Interfaith Dialogue and Religious Literacy; Dr. Elizabeth Prodromou: Professor of Conflict Resolution, The Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, Tufts University, will speak on Orthodoxy and Global Engagement; Dr. Carrie Frederick Frost, Professor at Saint Sophia Ukrainian Orthodox Theological Seminary, will speak on Voices of Orthodox Christian Women; and Christina G. Hioureas, Counsel, Chair, United Nations Practice Group, Foley Hoag, will speak on Orthodoxy, Human Rights and Advocacy.

The Director, who will moderate the discussion, will address the work of the Department under the theme, *Looking Beyond Ourselves to Share the Gospel with Others*.

The Department of Inter-Orthodox, Ecumenical and Interfaith Relations of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America is tasked with transforming the world through the Holy Gospel. This goal is achieved by collaborative work with numerous individuals and organizations in four main areas of engagement: Inter-Orthodox; Ecumenical; Interfaith; and Church and Society. Consequently, the Department brings the message of the Church in quite unique spaces. Whether through official theological dialogues, print and online publications, workshops and conferences, the Department insists that we look "outward," that is, to the world, and thus avoid the pitfalls of parochialism.

Forging strong and lasting partnerships with some of the most influential organizations and individuals helps the Department reaffirm the place of our Archdiocese in society at large and strengthens its reputation as an important national Church presence in the United States.

LOOKING BEYOND OURSELVES TO SHARE THE GOSPEL WITH OTHERS: THE VERY REVEREND ARCHIMANDRITE NATHANAEL SYMEONIDES

The Very Reverend Archimandrite Nathanael Symeonides was born in Thessaloniki, Greece (1978). He is a graduate of Hellenic College (BA, 2000) and of Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology (MDiv, 2003). He earned an STM (2003) and a ThD (2007) in Bioethics from Boston University. Fr. Nathanael has also studied the history and ethics of public health at Columbia University Mailman School of Public Health. He is a guest professor of Christian ethics and bioethics at Fordham University, Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology, and Saint Vladimir Theological School. Fr. Nathanael was ordained a Deacon (2003) and a Presbyter (2010) by His Eminence Geron Archbishop Demetrios of America. His ecclesial and pastoral work includes service as the Deacon to Metropolitan Methodios (2003-2006); Deacon to the Archbishop (2006-2010); Pastor of the Annunciation Greek Orthodox Church, NY (2010-2013). During his time as a parish priest, Fr. Nathanael developed an urban ministry, Orthodox Christians in Action (OPA), which harnessed the gifts and talents of the faithful, especially the energy of over 400

young professionals of Manhattan, offering them ways to create meaningful change in the lives of those most vulnerable in society.

In September of 2013 he was appointed Director of the Office of Inter-Orthodox, Ecumenical and Interfaith Relations of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America. In his present position, Fr. Nathanael manages and directs the relationships between the Archdiocese and numerous religious organizations, think tanks, nongovernmental organizations, and Permanent Missions to the United Nations. Most recently, he co-convened a colloquium entitled. *Orthodoxy* and *Humanitarianism*: Ideas and Action in the Contemporary World, which brought together experts from around the world to discuss ways that the Church may help alleviate humanitarian crises and promote sustainable development. He is also an active member of a special DC-based Working Group on Religious Pluralism in the Middle East.

Fr. Nathanael is a brother of the historic monastic community of *St. George Epanosifis* in Crete, Greece.



Interfaith Dialogue and Reconciliation: Joyce S. Dubensky


Joyce S. Dubensky is the CEO of Tanenbaum, a globally recognized organization known for its innovation in combating religious prejudice and hate, and for advancing respect for people of all beliefs. Tanenbaum's groundbreaking programs have grown under Ms. Dubensky's leadership and now reach the world's leading multi-national companies, health care institutions, educators and religious peacebuilders; its Peacemakers in Action Network today leads the field of religious peacebuilding in innovation and influence. Internationally in demand, Ms. Dubensky presents to diverse audiences across the world including at the United Nations, the United States Institute of Peace, the Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology, the Alliance for Civilizations, and the Fletcher School at Tufts, among others.



DR. ELIZABETH H. Prodromou

ORTHODOXY AND GLOBAL ENGAGEMENT: Dr. Elizabeth H. Prodromou

Dr. Elizabeth H. Prodromou is Visiting Associate Professor of Conflict Resolution at The Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy at Tufts University. She is a nonresident Fellow at The Hedayah International Center of Excellence for Countering Violent Extremism (Abu Dhabi) and a Senior Fellow in National Security and International Policy at the Center for American Progress (Washington, DC). In addition to her diplomatic service as Vice Chair and Commissioner on the U.S. Commission on International Religious Freedom (2004-2012), she served in an advisory capacity as a member of the U.S. Secretary of State's Religion & Foreign Policy Working Group (2011-2015). Her research focuses on religion and geopolitics, and she is a well-known expert on Orthodox Christianity and Islam. Her current research focuses on the security and human rights implications of Christian sustainability in a religiously plural Middle East, as well as on Greece as a critical case study of how mixed migration flows are reshaping the religion-security nexus in Europe. Published widely in scholarly and policy journals and a frequent contributor and commentator in international media, she holds a Ph.D. and an S. M. in political science from MIT, an M.A.L.D. from The Fletcher School of Law & Diplomacy, and a B.A. in International Relations and History from Tufts University. She is co-editor and contributor for *Eastern* Orthodox Christianity and American Higher Education and Thinking Through Faith: New Perspectives from Orthodox Christian Scholars.



REFLECTIONS ON THE HOLY AND GREAT COUNCIL BY ORTHODOX WOMEN: DR. CARRIE FREDERICK FROST

Carrie Frederick Frost, PhD is a scholar of Orthodox theology and a Professor at Saint Sophia Ukrainian Orthodox Seminary. She received a PhD in Theology, Ethics, and Culture from the University of Virginia. Her theological work focuses on motherhood, family, childhood, and men and women in Orthodox Christianity. She is on the board of the International Orthodox Theological Association and Saint Phoebe Center for the Deaconess.

She is the editor of *The Reception of the Holy and Great Council: Reflections of Orthodox Christian Women*, a volume of essays authored by an international group of Orthodox Christian women offering a diversity of responses to the Holy and Great Council of 2016 that will be published by the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese Department of Inter-Orthodox Ecumenical and Interfaith Relations in early 2018. Her book on the intertwined physicality and spirituality of motherhood, *Maternal Body: A Theology of Motherhood from the Christian East* will also be released in 2018.

Descended from Russians who immigrated to the US in the early twentieth century, she grew up in a Carpatho-Russian parish and now attends both a Greek Orthodox and an Orthodox Church in America parish. She, her husband, and their five children reside in Washington State.



Orthodoxy, Human Rights and Advocacy: Christina Hioureas

Christina Hioureas is Counsel at Foley Hoag LLP in the firm's International Litigation & Arbitration practice and Chair of the United Nations practice group, a group that she co-founded. Based in New York, Christina represents States, State-owned and private entities, and individuals on international arbitration disputes and public international law matters. Hioureas also advises States on matters before the United Nations and its bodies. She serves as arbitrator in international commercial disputes.

Hioureas' practice includes: international investment treaty claims (ICSID, UNCITRAL); international commercial arbitration (ICC, ICDR/AAA, LCIA, Swiss Rules) and litigation; State-to-State disputes and advisory opinion proceedings before the International Court of Justice (ICJ); treaty drafting and interpretation; climate change and rising sea levels; international human rights claims; protection of cultural property; minority rights issues; capacity building trainings for State Sovereigns; and energy law and pricing disputes.

In addition to her private practice, Hioureas served as the Special Legal Adviser to the Permanent Mission of the Republic of Cyprus to the United Nations, representing the State before the United Nations Sixth Committee to the General Assembly (Legal Affairs) and the United Nations Commission on International Trade Law (UNCITRAL).

Her academic experience includes serving as an Adjunct Professor of Law at Fordham University School of Law and Graduate Student Instructor at the University of California, Berkeley - in the Peace & Conflict Studies Department. She is also on the Teaching Staff of the University of Piraeus in the Energy Strategy, Law & Economics Program and the Yeosu Academy of International Law in the Republic of Korea.
